

European Economy and Business Management (EWUF)

Degree programme research focuses

The **European Economy and Business Management** degree programmes focus on companies and how they are embedded in social and institutional operating frameworks at the national and international level, in line with the focal points of the curriculum.

As a result, the programmes cover the following relevant interdisciplinary topics:

- Digitalisation and the transformation of the current social framework, sustainable management and circular business relationships
- Globalisation of national companies
- The effects of economic and financial crises

The programmes also contribute directly to the university's various research fields: New Work, New Business; Location Competition and Regions; Financial Market Development and Regulation; and Sustainable Management and Social Transformation.

With regard to European integration and its international effects for developed and less developed countries, specialised interdisciplinary research concentrates on the following key topics:

- Implementing European sustainability targets and their impacts on businesses
- History, status quo and future prospects for European politics
- Perspectives on global macroeconomic trends and their impact on households and companies
- Socio-economic effects of European economic policy and European integration
- Theory and system of fundamental and human rights, civil law principles, and methods of legal practices
- Legal ethics and international labour disputes

Analysis centres on the *transdisciplinary consideration of European and international developments*, with legal studies, political science and economics providing the framework, as well as highlighting interrelationships with developments in business.

As the *significance of cross-cultural skills* is another component of the curriculum-related observation of companies, and such skills are significantly enhanced by learning a compulsory elective language and improving English language proficiency, research is also carried out on the importance of language abilities and their effects on cross-cultural behaviours and understanding; this forms part of applied linguistic research. In this regard, application of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages helps to establish links between education-based linguistic research and cross-cultural skills.
